### EMERGENCY NOTIFICATION

Certain types of emergencies may require members, guests, valets and Grove staff to return to their camps or seek shelter in the nearest available building. You will be notified of such an emergency by **intermittent blasts** of the Grove emergency notification horn.

Other types of emergencies may call for a complete evacuation of the Grove. This will be signaled by **a sustained blast** of the emergency horn.

In the event of an emergency, the Grove emergency management team will circulate throughout the Grove and provide you with instructions on where to go and when it is safe to resume normal activities.

## FIFTY YEARS AGO

**THE YEAR** 1958 records Mao Zedong's Great Leap Forward, the French war in Algeria and De Gaulle's election as President of France, the appearance of Fidel Castro's Cuban guerrillas, Khrushchev's chairmanship of the USSR Council of Ministers and school desegregation in Arkansas. Bell introduced the first modern data phone, stereo records were released commercially and the first aluminum cans, the external pacemaker, and bifocal lenses were introduced; the nuclear submarine Nautilus traveled under the Arctic, the US launched the first moon rocket, the first satellite was launched and NASA was established and Parkinson's Law was published.

**IN THE ARTS,** the Beatles were formed, Boris Pasternak received the Nobel Prize for Literature and the Guggenheim Museum opened. In literature, there appeared Truman Capote's *Breakfast at Tiffany's*, Graham Greene's *Our Man in Havana*, Jack Kerouac's *The Dharma Bums*, Léon Uris' *Exodus* and Galbraith's *The Affluent Society*. Hollywood premiered *The Old Man and the Sea*, *The Last Hurrah*, *Gigi*, *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof*, *Auntie Mame*, *South Pacific*, *Rawhide*, *Separate Tables* and *A Night to Remember*. In music, popular songs included the Kingston Trio's *Tom Dooley*, *Chanson d'Amour*, *The Purple People Eater*, *Chipmunk Song*, and *Catch a Falling Star*. *Cha Cha Cha* was the new dance vogue, and Menotti founded the Spoleto Festival. Deaths of the year included Pope Pius XII, the actors Tyrone Power and Ronald Colman and American photographer Edward Weston.

**AT THE CITY CLUB,** Thursday Nights included Faculty Night, Lincoln Night, Roaring Twenties Night, Band Night, Aviary Night, Tunerville Night, Vaudeville Night, All Hallow's E'en Night, and Railroad Night; the Christmas Play was *The Sergeant's Dream* by Kendrick Morrish; luncheons were held in honor of Prince Bertil of Sweden, the Earl of Elgin, Major General Sir Allan Adair, and to greet the gentlemen of the Old Vic Company.



## FIFTY YEARS AGO

**AT THE GROVE**, a new distinctive entrance was installed and named the John J. Lermen Gate; the hospital and fire house were painted a new, brown color to make them less conspicuous; a more suitable platform for Lakeside speakers was built; the road into the Grove was raised four feet to eliminate water holes and the boundary of the Grove opposite the end of Smith Creek Road was straightened and the new line recorded. During the Encampment, there were 378 individual visits to the hospital, eight of which were hospital cases and two ambulance calls. The **LOW JINKS** *Artemisia* was a colorful, tuneful romp set in ancient Rome involving a senatorial campaign and the love affair between *Artemisia*, a virgin slave, and *Cais*, a centurion, while the plot was stirred up by labor leader *Schropulus Gyppus*. The **GROVE PLAY** *Aloha Oe* by author Earl C. Anthony, a pioneer in the automobile business and in broadcasting, was rewritten and recast with the help of his Hollywood friends and the genius of composer-conductor Rico Marcelli; the plot bridged the legends, music, and the songs of Hawaii with Bohemia.

The President reported that the Club continued in a healthy position – both creatively and financially – and the Jinks Committee reported that it has concentrated on three principal objectives: to provide the best possible entertainment, to get the best possible Jinks Material Associate Members into the Club, and to make the most widespread use of the Club's general membership.

With the emphasis by the Jinks Committee on the development of new talent in the Club and the improvements by the Grove Committee at both theaters and at the Lake, Bohemia continues its dedication to the performance of the arts.

## GENERAL INFO & GROVE NOTICES

### PARKING

Members may drive their personal vehicles to camps to drop off supplies until Thursday, July 10 at 11:00 AM provided they have received clearance from the General Manager or Grovekeeper. Only Grove vehicles, or those specifically authorized in advance, will be allowed to enter the Grove after 11:00 AM. No automobiles or bicycles are permitted past the Registration Gate. All vehicles must display an Event Pass. Vehicles that do not have an Event Pass will be directed to the Solutions Area for verification of identity. If you want to park your own car, use the lower lot and lock your car securely. You may leave your tagged baggage on the dock in the lower parking lot. All cars checked in and out at the upper baggage dock must be parked and removed only by attendants who are on duty. Parking space is limited so whenever possible ride with others.

**Please note: All parking is at your own risk. The Club attendants will park your car for you but any damages incurred are the vehicle owner's responsibility.**

### BAGGAGE

**Incoming:** Members and guests have the choice of unloading their baggage at either the loading dock at the Valet Parking area or the lower self-park loading dock. There are different colored baggage tags for each "area" in the Grove (e.g. Snob Hill, River Road Left, etc.). Signs are in place to show the area in which your camp is located. Write your name and camp name on each baggage tag. Normal delivery time is approximately one hour. During peak times (Thurs/Fri afternoon), delivery may take up to 2 hours. In the event you believe your bag has been misplaced, complete a Lost Bag Form which is available at Civic Center and Registration. Untagged baggage will remain on the loading dock where it was placed.

**Outgoing:** All outgoing bags must have a Gate Tag attached (red tag signifies "upper loading dock" and a pink tag with a stripe signifies "lower loading dock"). Place gate-tagged baggage at the entrance to your camp and it will be picked up and delivered to the appropriate loading dock. All unclaimed outgoing baggage will be sent to the City Club on the Monday following the Encampment.



## GROVE RULES

### REGISTRATION

Members and guests must check in and out each time they enter or leave the Grove. **An identification card will be issued to all members and guests at the Registration Gate. This card must be carried with you at all times.**

### CAMP BROMLEY SPACE ASSIGNMENT

Applications to reserve space at Camp Bromley are available from Julie Hanson's office at the City Club.

### GROVE RULES FOR ENCAMPMENT

As far as applicable, all House Rules at the City Club shall be in force in the Grove unless they conflict with the Grove Rules (published in the Red Book), in which case the latter shall govern:

- **The Old Guard benches** are reserved until showtime. Please do not use them unless they remain unclaimed after the show begins.
- **Chairs on the lawn:** Chairs with legs (or stools) are not permitted in Campfire Circle or on the lawn during the Lakeside Talks.
- **Tree trimming:** Trees, limbs and branches of trees, shrubbery, ferns, roots and stumps are the property of the Club and shall be respected as such. No unauthorized trimming, removal, etc., is permitted.
- **Decorations:** The use of decorations and emblems in private camps shall be subject to the control of the Grove Committee.
- **Employee identification:** Camp employees must at all times wear identification badges as prescribed by the Grove Committee.
- **Appropriate attire** is required in the Grove.
- **Amplification by a camp requires prior approval by the Grove Captain.** The basic guideline for any amplification within a camp is that it should not unreasonably disturb another camp. In general, amplification within camps is discouraged by the Grove Committee.

**No amplification will be permitted in the Grove on Saturday, July 12th except at Jinks Committee events.** No amplification is permitted between the hours of 12:30 AM and 9:00 AM. The Grove Committee has control over use and possession of all musical instruments within the Grove. Please do not play any musical instrument between the hours of 1:00 AM and 9:00 AM.

- **Firearms** may be brought to the Grove only for use at the skeet and trap range and must be left at the Registration Gate. **Only broken-action shotguns are permitted. Automatic and pump-action shotguns are not permitted.** Fireworks shall be used only under the supervision of the Grove and Jinks Committees.
- **Pets** are not allowed in the Grove or the parking lots at any time.
- **Tipping:** Do not tip staff employees or ask them to perform personal services in or out of the Grove.
- **Do not reprimand employees:** Report any incident of discourtesy or inattentiveness to the Club's General Manager, Matt Oggero or management staff.
- **Outside publication:** Do not reproduce or publish scripts, pictures, music or accounts of the Grove outside of the Club.
- **Weaving spiders:** Selling tickets, distributing circulars (other than for Grove shows), soliciting funds, requesting autographs or advertising is prohibited at the Grove.
- **Behavior at the grove:** A member or guest who conducts him/herself in a manner unbecoming of a gentleman may be expelled from the Grove by order of the Grove Captain or, in his absence, by any member of the Grove Committee.



## BUS SERVICE IN THE GROVE

### Gate to Diana

From Registration Gate past Museum, First Aid Station, Ice House, Civic Center, Grove Store, Bar and Grill to Campfire Circle and Diana (transfer point to other buses) and return.

### River Road

From Diana along River Road to Guard House on Smith Creek (Swimming Hole and Chalet) and return.

### Morse Stephens Canyon

From Diana along River Road to Pig 'n Whistle, then up Morse Stephens Canyon and return.

### Kitchen Hill

From Diana up Kitchen Hill Road to Jinks Band Camp via Care Less Camp and back to Diana.

### Rogers Hill

From Civic Center to Wohwohno and back to Diana.

### Snob Hill

Circling from Diana up the front side and down the back side of Snob Hill Road and back to Diana.

### Late Night Service

After 1:00 AM, a continuously patrolling bus will travel all routes.

### Interruption of Service

During the Cremation of Care, Lakeside Talks and Orchestra and Band Concerts, the River Road and Morse Stephens Canyon buses will originate at Field Circle and will not pass the Lake. During Museum Talks and afternoon shows on the Museum Theater Stage, the Rogers Hill bus will not run.

## FIRST AID STATION

First aid and limited emergency medical care are available 24 hours each day at the Infirmary which is located adjacent to the Firehouse near the entrance to the Grove. Charges will be assessed for each visit.

The Club is not responsible for administration or processing of claims submitted to a member or guest's health care provider.

## DEFIBRILLATORS

Defibrillators are located at the Hospital, Dining Circle, Grill, Command Post and Civic Center. In addition, defibrillators have been installed at all emergency phone locations throughout the Grove. These defibrillators are easy to use and are designed to guide the untrained user through the necessary steps to resuscitate someone who is in cardiac arrest. Follow these steps:

- Pick up the emergency phone and alert the medical team to the problem
- Remove the AED and follow instructions to resuscitate the individual in distress
- Send campmates for help

## MESSAGES

Messages for members and guests will be filed alphabetically at Civic Center between 7:00 AM and 6:00 PM; after 6:00 PM, use the message phone in front of Civic Center. **Neither fax nor overnight package service is available in the Grove.**

**EMERGENCY MESSAGES** will be hand-delivered to an individual's camp.

### FIELD TRIPS TO FORT ROSS

Monday, July 14 and Monday, July 21, depart from the Museum at 10:00 AM and travel by carpool eleven miles north of Jenner for a tour led by Bohemian Dimitri Ilyin of the historic Russian fort. Those who can make vehicles available for transportation should bring their parking tickets. A Siberian-Alaskan-style luncheon will be provided. Reservations at the Museum by the previous day are essential.

Sun protection is advised. Cameras are welcome.

### FLY CASTING DEMONSTRATIONS

Sunday, July 13 and 20, Monday, July 21, and Thursday, July 24, at 4:00 PM Bohemians Ray Lewis and Ralph Osterling will demonstrate and give tips on their specialty at the Lakeside. Beginners and old hands are invited to try new equipment.

### GROVE MUSEUM

An exhibit of the natural history of the Grove; open at all times for your enjoyment. The Museum contains a large topographic scale model of the Grove that shows trails, roads and trees.

### HIKING

The backcountry of the Grove, 2,752 acres of woodland hills and valleys, and has 80 miles of trails and roads waiting to be explored. Consult the map "Walking Bohemia's Home," available at the Civic Center. Pay attention to the section "Hazards and Pests."

Those who are new to the Grove, seeking a hiking partner, or interested in getting out of the valley, meet at the Museum at 7:15 AM each morning, beginning July 12th. A bus will depart each morning from the river gate guardhouse at 7:00 AM and proceed along River Road to pick up hikers for assembly at the Museum. Hikes take one to two hours and will be tailored to meet the needs of the walker (uphill, downhill or both). Hiking leaders: Bill Baker, George Breed, David Bidwell, William Heydorn, Stewart Ring and Jack Ripsteen. Please note: no smoking on the trails; shirts must be worn; hiking shoes and a container of water are recommended.

### JOGGING

Jogging is allowed in the Grove only outside camp areas. Smith Creek Road has a gentle grade and is well suited to jogging, as are portions of the Ridge roads. Joggers who wish to run outside the Grove are required to check in and out at the Registration Gate. **Remember to carry your identification card.** Appropriate clothing, including shirts, is required throughout the Grove, with the exception of sunbathing during Lakeside Talks and at the Swimming Hole.

### LIBRARY

The Library is located at the Civic Center and holds a collection of novels and mysteries as well as diverse nonfiction titles.

## ACTIVITIES

### STAR RIDES

Monday, July 14 and Monday, July 21 at 8:45 PM; Don Bull conducts a special ride to view the stars. The Osprey and Osprey II buses leave from the Museum and return at 10:30 PM. Bring a warm coat. Space is limited; first come, first served.

### SWIMMING AND CANOEING

Facilities will operate at the River from Friday, July 11 through Saturday, July 26. Lifeguards are on duty at the Swimming Hole from 10:00 AM to 7:00 PM. Changing rooms are available. Suits, towels and canoes may be rented. Soft drinks, wine and beer may be purchased.

### TRAP AND SKEET SHOOTING

Beginning on Friday, July 11 and continuing through Saturday, July 26, 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM daily (except Sundays, July 13 and 20, when the range will be closed).

Buses leave the Civic Center every half hour from 8:30 AM to noon, and shooting stops promptly at 1:00 PM. Loaner guns are available. Tournament and/or camp competition may be shot at any time the field is open. Camp teams (five men per team, highest four scores to count) may include guests residing in the camp.

All guns must be checked when you enter the Grove. **Please log your gun in using the clipboard at the gun trailer near the upper baggage dock.** Guns will be transported to and from the field and returned to the Registration Gate on the last Sunday or earlier at your request.

Range Employees can be identified by their bright orange polo shirts. They have been instructed to watch for safety violations and notify members or guests if they violate range rules.

Please do not argue with Range Employees. Report any incidents involving Range Employees to the Range Manager. Instruction is not permitted at busy times on the Skeet or Trap ranges. If you have never shot a shotgun before, or have limited experience, you are required to check in with the Range Manager prior to shooting in a squad.

**Automatic and pump-action shotguns are not permitted.  
Only broken-action shotguns are permitted on the range.**

### SHOOTING RANGE SAFETY RULES

1. Keep firearms pointed in a safe direction at all times (especially during skeet shooting). Pointing a gun at any individual, even momentarily or accidentally, is prohibited.
2. Only Club supplied ammunition is allowed.
3. Ear and eye protection shall be worn at all times while shooting.
4. Instruction or "coaching" of new shooters is not permitted at busy times.
5. Guns may only be loaded in the shooting box when it is your turn to shoot. Actions must be kept open at all other times.
6. Load only one shell at a time when shooting singles.
7. NEVER break the firing line with the muzzle of your gun.
8. Gun handling is not allowed while anyone is down range. When an orange traffic cone is displayed, guns must be unloaded and placed on the gun rack.
9. Members and Guests may not transport their guns to and from the range.
10. Violations of the range rules may result in ejection from the range.
